The Uniqueness of the Central Valley


- High Concentration of Poverty
- Three metropolitan areas in California's Central Valley are
 regions with the highest farm revenues in the country, and rank
 among the poorest in the state and nation. Fresno, Modesto
 and Bakersfield- Delano are among the top five U.S. regions
 with the highest percentage of residents living below the
 poverty line" (Almendrala 2012).
- In the Central Valley counties of Kings, Kern, Tulare, Madera,
 Merced and Fresno, the average poverty rate is 24.3% (704,043)
 - US Census Bureau, July 2016




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Poverty Varies Significantly Across California Counties



The Uniqueness...

- High Concentration of Undereducated
- Three metropolitan areas in the Central Valley rank in the top 10 least literate cities in the nation: #1 Bakersfield, #3 Stockton, and #8 Fresno (Frohlich and Hess 2014).
- Within the Central Valley 24.6% (712,414) of adults do not possess a high school diploma or GED. These are the adults that seek services from K-12 Adult Schools.
- HSD/GED 25 years and older.

Immigrant Integration from 1856 to 2017

- In the Central Valley (Kings, Kern, Tulare, Madera, Merced, Fresno), persons age 5 years or older, who speak a language other than English at home is 46%.
- 1,321,625 people where English is their second language (ESL)
- Adult schools also have a focus on parents of K-12.
 As of this week, 67% of parents in Clovis Adult School's ESL program are parents of K-12 students.
 At Fresno Adult, 78% of the ESL parents have a K-12 student.





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
Dolores Arechiga is a student at Merced Adult School. She came to the United States in May of 2003 and married her husband Brian in August.

They met in Mexico and planned to move to the US for a better future.

Dolores began ESL classes at the Sacred Heart Church in San Jose for three months where she learned a lot.

In January 2016, Dolores and her husband moved to Merced. They purchased a home, afterward, she decided to take advantage of the opportunities for an education, and enrolled at Merced Adult School. She enrolled in a citizenship class and a pre-HSE class. Not long after, she was promoted to the GED class where she earned her GED and also her citizenship!

Dolores is now taking the Computer & Office Technology class, where she is gaining the skills needed to become employed. Dolores is currently working on becoming certified in the Microsoft Suite.





Michael Barron, Jr came to Owens Valley Career Development – Family Literacy Program – Adult Education Services around February 2016. Michael is a member of the Tejon Tribe. At the time he was laid off from work, and he had no high school diploma or GED.

Michael was accepted into the Adult Education Services and began attending courses Monday through Friday. He completed and passed the GED in July 2016. He studied and prepared for the ASVAB Military Test. He obtained the required scores and completed all necessary requirements. He received a Certificate of Enlistment on November 21, 2016. He was officially enlisted in the United States Army, and was scheduled to attend Boot Camp in May 2017. While waiting to attend Boot Camp, Michael received assistance with prepping for and passing the LAPD exam. Also he received a Food Handler's Certificate (SERVSafe) in 10/2016.

Recently, Michael returned home to Bakersfield and is now an Army reservist. His plan is to pursue a career in the LAPD.

Michael is excited about the opportunity to share his experiences while utilizing Adult Education Services from OVCDC. He stated that he wanted to make sure he took advantage of every opportunity that's been offered and to encourage others do the same thing, while explaining the many benefits to obtaining a GED.


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


Luis Gomez, as a teenager in high school, many things distracted him from concentrating on school. He left school in 2009, when he learned that he would not be able to graduate with his class.


After working a few different jobs and hitting multiple dead- ends, Luis realized that he wasn't going to get ahead without an education. He registered for Sanger Adult School to earn his high school diploma in 2014. When he returned to school, he had a wife and daughter to support. The Independent Study Program allowed him to continue working fulltime to support his family and study at night.

Luis graduated from Sanger Adult School in 2015. After investigating a variety of career options, he landed a job at Creative Alternatives School as an Instructional Aide. Currently, he is working as a Transportation Coordinator for the same school. This job has allowed Luis the financial freedom to buy a house for his family.

All and all, Luis is living a comfortable and productive life. He is grateful for the opportunity to attend adult school to finish his high school diploma. Luis said, "I feel that I wouldn't be where I am today without the adult school".





California's Workforce Development System


















WIOA-Funded Services Eligibility

General Eligibility


- U.S. citizen or authorized to work in the U.S.
- Registered with Selective Service (males born after Dec 31, 1969)

Adult and Dislocated Worker

- Adults Receiving TANF, are low income, are basic skills deficient, or have limited English
- Dislocated Workers Terminated or laid off, or received a notice of termination or layoff
- 18 years or older

Youth

- Low Income and have a least one barrier
- 14 to 24 years of age Minimum 75% of Youth must be out-of-school (ages 16-24)
